Additionally, it would help improve accountability if council members have their own staff who can help council respond to constituent needs and track and manage policy development. So, I'm interested in making council full time, with at least one staff per council person that reports directly to that council person; the mayor should have at least two staff who report directly to the mayor. (Added under sec. 2.35 and 2.4 as "Full time Council with additional staff") <br> - Form of governance: I don't know that I think we should change from a city manager system, because there is great value to having highly competent bureaucrats protected from too much political reactivity, but I am concerned about ways to improve accountability between council members and the mayor and staff. I am interested in a comparison of the pros and cons of the existing system against a system where an empowered mayor would have a strong chief of staff and department heads would report to city council, or something similar. I realize the council can do investigations, but they don't seem to use that function. In short, I'm interested in really having a deep dive about governance and seeing if there are tweaks we can make to the system that would improve accountability, transparency and equity.
