Section 1. That the Council of the City of Tacoma concurs with the Board of Contracts and Awards to adopt the recommendation for award as set forth in the attached Exhibit "A."

Section 2. That the proper officers of the City are hereby authorized to increase and extend Contract No. CW2233677, with BERK Consulting, Inc., in the amount of \$201,520.00, plus applicable taxes, for a cumulative total of

RESOLUTION NO. 41407

A RESOLUTION relating to the Department of Public Utilities, Beltline Division, (d.b.a. "Tacoma Rail"); authorizing the acceptance of a grant from the Washington State Department of Ecology, in the amount of \$3,300,000. and depositing said sum into the Tacoma Rail Fund, for the acquisition of a zero-emission, battery-electric switcher locomotive.

WHEREAS the City of Tacoma, Department of Public Utilities, Division (d.b.a. "Tacoma Rail"), was awarded a grant in the amount of \$3,300,000, from the Washington State Department of Ecology, to assist with the acquisition of a zero emission battery-electric switcher locomotive, and

WHEREAS the grant funds were awarded as a distribution from the State's Volkswagen Settlement Fund after a competitive call for projects from the Department of Ecology, and

WHEREAS this project will continue Tacoma Rail's efforts toward decarbonization by eliminating the annual consumption of up to 30,000 gallons of diesel fuel by replacing a genset diesel-electric locomotive with a batteryelectric locomotive and rendering two diesel engines manufactured between 2008 and 2009 inoperable, and

WHEREAS it is anticipated that the installation of locomotive charging equipment from the initial battery-electric project will be sufficient to support this additional battery-electric switcher locomotive, and

WHEREAS the current estimated cost for a battery-electric switcher locomotive is approximately \$5,500,000 and Tacoma Rail will be required to cover all associated project costs that exceed this grant award, and

WHEREAS Section 4.11 of the Tacoma City Charter requires that all matters relating to the "incurring of indebtedness . . . shall be initiated by the

Board, subject to approval by the Council, and executed by the Board," prior to acceptance of the agreement, and

WHEREAS, by adoption of Public Utility Board Resolution No. U-11452 on April 10, 2024, the Public Utility Board approved the proposed grant agreement, pending authorization by the City Council; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That the City of Tacoma, Department of Public Utilities,
Beltline Division (d.b.a. "Tacoma Rail") is authorized to accept the grant funding
in the amount of \$3,300,000 from the Washington State Department of Ecology,
to assist with the acquisition of a zero-emission battery-electric switcher
locomotive, and to deposit said funding into the Tacoma Rail Fund.



Section 2. That the proper officers of the City are authorized to execute any necessary or convenient agreements needed to complete the acceptance of the grant funding with the State of Washington Department of Ecology, subject to all agreements being approved as to form by the City Attorney's Office. ORDINANCE NO. 28962

AN ORDINANCE relating to land use regulation; enacting a temporary moratorium on the nomination and designation of new Historic Special Review and Conservation Districts, for a period of one year.

WHEREAS Tacoma Municipal Code ("TMC") 13.07.060 outlines regulations for the local Tacoma Register of Historic Places and the nomination and designation process for Historic Special Review and Conservation Districts ("Districts"), and

WHEREAS the Landmarks Preservation Commission ("LPC") and Planning Commission ("PC") both have roles in reviewing nominations and making recommendations, and,

WHEREAS in reviewing applications for Districts over the last year, both commissions noted concerns about the existing historic district designation process and recommended that a review and potential update to the process should be conducted in the earliest possible plan and code amendment cycle, and

WHEREAS the PC adopted its Work Program for 2023-2025 in November 2023, and the City Council's Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee concurred with the work program in December 2023, and the work program includes the 2024 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update, which is anticipated to be completed in mid-2025, and

WHEREAS a Historic Preservation Plan Update including a policy/code review of local historic districts is included in the current scope for the 2024 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update ("Comprehensive Plan"), and



WHEREAS the requested review is planned to be included in the upcoming 2024 Comprehensive Plan update process, however, in the interim, applications for Districts may continue to be submitted, and

WHEREAS by Resolution No. 41226, the City Council directed the PC, in coordination with the LPC, to conduct a public process to develop findings of fact and recommendations as to whether a moratorium on nomination and designation of local historic districts is warranted, and the PC adopted a review schedule and set a public hearing on September 20, 2023, and

WHEREAS following the public hearing, the PC also sought feedback and input from the LPC, and

WHEREAS the LPC did not feel that a moratorium was a necessary step to address existing policy issues within the normal scope of its work, but the PC found there are significant unresolved policy and code questions relating to historic district creation, and the PC workplan would benefit from a temporary pause on historic district review afforded by a moratorium, and

WHEREAS the PC expressed that before the establishment of any new
Districts additional study was needed regarding the interplay between the current
code and the City's efforts to increase all income housing availability, and increase
housing density within the City, and

WHEREAS the PC further noted that before the establishment of any new

Districts study of the current code was needed to focus on addressing the impacts

of systemic racism on home ownership and wealth-building opportunities for people of color in the City, and

WHEREAS, in its recommendation to the City Council regarding the proposed moratorium, the Commission noted that Council Ordinance 28793, which adopted Home In Tacoma Phase 1, in part "strengthened Tacoma's commitment to 'addressing the lingering impacts of systemic racism and facilitating home ownership and wealth-building opportunities for people of color.", and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission also advised that the Landmarks Commission may need time to review its current program components for potential unintentional contributions to the legacy effects of discriminatory housing policies and, therefore, the primary policy questions regarding local historic districts are centered on Tacoma's residential areas to support that focus the moratorium should be limited to residential areas, and

WHEREAS on November 15, 2023, the PC voted to recommend that the City Council establish a moratorium on the consideration and adoption of new Districts for a period of one year while the PC's established workplan on the subject is implemented, and

WHEREAS on March 5, 2024, the City Council held a public hearing to seek comment on the PC recommendation; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That the City Council hereby adopts the Recitals of this Ordinance as its formal legislative findings.



Section 2. That a temporary moratorium on the nomination and designation of new Historic Special Review and Conservation Districts, is hereby enacted, for a period of one year or until the work is complete whichever is less.

Section 3. This moratorium shall be applicable only to those areas of Tacoma that have the following residential land use designations: Low-Scale Residential; Mid-Scale Residential; High-Density Multifamily; Airport Compatibility Residential.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance or its application to any person or situation should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or its application to any other person or situation.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective ten days after its publication.
