Past LPC Questions

Some of what we heard at the June LPC meeting:

- Commissioners interested in expanding tools for preservation of cultural sites
- Need to find ways to reduce fees and requirements
- Preservation of small-scale housing is critical
- HP Program as knowledge center what gets preserved gets validated as knowledge
- May need to expand separation of designation from controls/incentives
- Interested in expanding the capacity & resources of the HP program



Overview of Structural Changes

HP Plan

- Remove HP Plan as a program element and include as full element within the Comprehensive Plan
- Amend policies for consistency with City housing and growth goals
- Depopulate the policies that are redundant with those in other elements
- Account for critical policy areas not currently reflected in historic resources code, such as DEI initiatives, sustainability, and resiliency
- Enhance treatment of cultural resources and Tribal concerns

Code

- Modify the nomination criteria and process for both individual landmarks and historic districts
- Clarify roles of Landmarks and Planning Commissions
- Revise the enforcement and demolition review processes



Policy Audit Principles

Structure and Content:

- Strengthen the connection between goals and policies
- Remove redundant language
- Connect everything to the Vision Statement and Focus Areas and reinforce the overall growth strategy

Language:

- Use more people-centered language that focuses on the experience that the City aims to create.
- Identify accountable parties and parties where possible
- Use a consistent term or terms for those we intend to serve with the plan. Replace "citizen" with a more inclusive term, such as "community member"
- Be more specific about equity terms, existing disparities, and priority groups.

Livable community with a strong sense of history

Sustainability & climate goals

- Maintain a comprehensive, citywide inventory of Tacoma's cultural and historic resources.
- Inclusive context statements.
- Integrate citywide survey into community planning efforts.
- Promote historic preservation's role in sustainability.



Black + other underrepresented communities

- Evaluate and update local criteria for architectural integrity, survey and assessment practices, and methods of defining eligible district boundaries to ensure they do not perpetuate exclusion of Black heritage.
- Partner with community-based organizations in neighborhoods with historically less access to preservation resources
- Allow hardship exemptions.
- Ensure resources specifically for underserved neighborhoods.
- Commemorative/cultural register.





Indigenous history is prioritized

Equitable Growth & Anti-Displacement

- Preserve archaeological resources.
- Partner with indigenous communities.
- Support adaptive reuse.
- Create and scale up programs and interventions that address cultural displacement.



Community Partnerships

Public Realm

- Support existing partnerships.
- Encourage new partnerships that represent city's diversity.
- Establish training and tools.
- Maintain interdepartmental dialogue.
- Maintain historic resources.
- Connect historic facilities to their contexts.





Efficient and transparent

Incentives

Clear, easy to use code

- Maintain a certified historic preservation program.
- Promote collaboration among LPC, City departments, boards and commissions.
- Create communication materials in diverse and accessible formats.
- Streamline project review and enforcement to promote preservation objectives.
- Adapt the Historic Preservation program to ensure that social and cultural significance is prioritized within the nomination process.
- Reduce design review requirements.
- Clear and effective demolition review procedures.
