1 WHEREAS the City's Office of Management and Budget estimates that 2 the City will collect \$5,796,000 in authorized vehicle license fees, and 3 \$9,493,127 from the sales tax increase of one tenth of one percent, which is a 4 decrease in revenues of \$5,668,429 from the previous biennium, as the 5 revenue generated from the sales tax increase of one tenth of one percent 6 7 sunsets on March 31, 2026, and 8 WHEREAS in addition, there are anticipated investment revenues of 9 \$51,772 and a planned use of \$364,400 of existing cash balance, for a total of 10 \$15,705,299 of TBD revenues for the 2025-2026 biennium, and 11 WHEREAS the proposed TBD Budget/Spending Plan includes the 12 13 regular planned transfer of \$5,800,000 to Streets Fund for street maintenance 14 and repair, with an additional \$387,650 specifically to replace aging fleet 15 equipment, a budgeted transfer of \$9,493,127 to the Streets Initiative Fund for 16 street maintenance and repair, and a balancing entry of \$24,522 to the ending 17 cash balance, for a total expense appropriation of \$15,705,299, and 18 19 WHEREAS RCW 36.73.020 states that the Board shall consider the 20 following criteria when selecting transportation improvements: (1) reduced risk of 21 transportation facility failure and improved safety; (2) improved travel time; (3) 22 improved air quality; (4) increases in daily and peak period trip capacity; (5) 23 improved modal connectivity; (6) improved freight mobility; (7) cost-effectiveness 24 25 of the investment; (8) optimal performance of the system through time; and (9) 26

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution approving the 2025-2026 Transportation Benefit District Budget and Spending Plan.

BACKGROUND:

This Department's recommendation is based on RCW 35.21.225 and 36.73.020 and City of Tacoma Ordinance No. 28099, which authorized the establishment of a Transportation Benefit District (TBD) for the purposes of acquiring, constructing, improving, providing, and funding transportation improvements within the TBD, consistent with any state, regional, or local transportation plans and necessitated by existing or reasonably foreseeable congestion levels.

On November 27, 2012, the TBD Governing Board (Board) adopted Resolution No. TBD 001 authorizing the collection of a vehicle license fee of \$20.

On July 14, 2015, the Board adopted Amended Resolution No. TBD 008 to place ballot measure Proposition No. 4, later referred to as Proposition A, on the ballot for the General Election. Proposition A, which authorized a sales tax increase of one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) to fund street improvements was passed in the November 3, 2015, General Election.

The City's Office of Management and Budget estimates the City will collect \$5,796,000 (authorized vehicle license fee) and \$9,493,127 (sales tax increase of one-tenth of one percent) in the 2025-2026 biennium. This is a decrease in revenues of \$5,668,429 from the previous biennium as the revenue generated from the sales tax increase of one tenth of one percent sunsets on March 31, 2026. In addition, there are anticipated investment revenues of \$51,772 and a planned use of \$364,400 of existing cash balance, bringing the total of TBD revenues for the 2025-2026 biennium to \$15,705,299.

The proposed Budget and Spending Plan includes the regular planned transfer of \$5,800,000 to the 1065 Streets fund along with an additional \$387,650 to 1065 Streets specifically to replace aging fleet equipment. In addition, there is a budgeted transfer of \$9,493,127 to the 1085 Streets Initiative fund, and a balancing entry of \$24,522 to the ending cash balance, for a total expense appropriation of \$15,705,299.

RCW 36.73.020 states the Board shall consider the following criteria when selecting transportation improvements: reduced risk of transportation facility failure and improved safety; improved travel time; improved air quality; increases in daily and peak period trip capacity; improved modal connectivity; improved freight mobility; cost-effectiveness of the investment; optimal performance of the system through time; and other criteria, as adopted by the governing body in Chapter 10.28 of the Tacoma Municipal Code.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

The TBD Budget and Spending Plan provide maintenance of the City's street system and affects all of Tacoma's residents. Maintenance projects are selected primarily upon the pavement condition of the City's street system and the Department uses the City's Equity Index to help guide selection of maintenance in underserved or underrepresented communities. A public hearing was held on October 29, 2024, which provided residents the opportunity to learn about and testify on the 2025-2026 TBD Budget and Spending Plan.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

The proposed 2025-2026 TBD Budget and Spending Plan will provide maintenance and repair of residential streets and the construction of new ADA accessible curb ramps at various locations throughout the City, as identified in Exhibit A, entitled "2025-2026 Transportation Benefit District Budget and Spending Plan". Maintenance projects are selected using best asset management practices and the City's Equity Index.

Economy/Workforce: Equity Index Score: High Opportunity

Increase the number of infrastructure projects and improvements that support existing and new business developments.

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).

The TBD Budget and Spending Plan will provide maintenance of the City's arterial and residential street system; improve safety, travel time, and air quality; increase in daily and peak period trip capacity; improve modal connectivity; and affect all of Tacoma's residents and businesses.

The authorized vehicle license fee of \$20 will generate an estimated \$5,796,000 (authorized vehicle license fee) and the sales tax increase of one-tenth of one percent will generate an estimated \$9,493,127 (sales tax increase of one-tenth of one percent), for a total of \$15,289,127 of TBD revenues in the 2025-2026 biennium. In addition, there are anticipated investment revenues of \$51,772 and a planned use of \$364,400 of existing cash balance, bringing the total of TBD revenues for the 2025-2026 biennium to \$15,705,299.
