Climate Action Plan Progress Report - Letter

The commission unanimously approved the subcommittee's draft letter below:

Dear Chair Walker and IPS Committee,

On behalf of the Sustainable Tacoma Commission (STC), we would like to extend our gratitude for the recent accomplishments that have been made regarding the requests made last year concerning the Climate Action Plan (CAP). While we celebrate these achievements, we recognize that there are still critical areas requiring further action and attention. This letter aims to outline these areas and propose suggested steps to ensure continued progress towards our shared goals.

- We are pleased that funding has been secured for two critical positions: the Climate Resilience
 Manager and the Landscape Architect. These roles are essential to developing and
 implementing strategies to enhance our city's resilience to climate impacts and ensure
 sustainable urban planning.
- We are encouraged by some of the progress made in protecting important habitat within our city. Although not realized in 2023, the recent WA Commerce grant awarded in 2024 to develop the Climate Ready Habitat Protection and Enhancement Strategy signifies a significant step forward in this regard.
- While there has been commendable focus on waste prevention, particularly with the
 acquisition of the EPA grant for a waste prevention specialist and community ambassador, we
 believe there is still room for improvement, especially in addressing food waste. The
 implementation of the Salvage and Deconstruction Resolution is a positive step towards
 reducing waste, and we encourage further efforts in this area.

As we consider the Climate Action Plan Progress Report of 2024, we acknowledge the significant strides taken, but also wish to highlight a few areas where further investment is needed.

- Given the increasing impacts from heat and smoke, we urge the City Council to commit to
 providing available and accessible safe spaces for communities to gather this summer. We
 acknowledge that the efforts to provide filter fans and communicate responses to the impacts
 of heat and smoke are ongoing.
- 2. We believe that **additional arborists** are necessary to effectively manage all public trees, including street trees, in Tacoma. We appreciate the recent updates to the tree Right of Way (ROW) code and the addition of a landscape architect to guide permit compliance.
- 3. **Transportation** emerges as a key priority as the largest emitter of climate pollution. We must address emissions through:
 - Freight electrification and electric vehicle (EV) infrastructure, especially in South
 Tacoma, a neighborhood identified as having increasing emissions in an already polluted
 area
 - Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) to ensure safe pedestrian and bicycle
 infrastructure for sustainable transportation options, especially for vulnerable
 populations in affordable housing. This is congruent with current efforts underway such
 as Home in Tacoma Phase II. TOD requires active transportation staff, local transit
 coordination, and vital grant match dollars.
- Additionally, we must explore more sustainable strategies so that our city purchases and contracts align with our environmental and equity objectives including Tacoma's Green Economic Development Strategy.

Looking ahead, we believe it is essential for STC to have a role in making **climate considerations in the budget review process** as mentioned in the Climate Accountability and Sustainability Commission

Charter amendment proposal. We also seek clarification on the next steps for the **Office of Environmental Policy and Sustainability (OEPS) Director and the organizational reporting structure,** as we feel that the current climate emergency requires clear and comprehensive departmental responses and accountability.

In closing, we remain committed to working collaboratively with the City Council to achieve our shared vision of a sustainable and resilient Tacoma. Thank you for your continued support and dedication to this important cause.



Highlighted Community Profile Takeaways

- Suburban areas outside of Tacoma are growing more rapidly than the city.
- Families with children are declining as a share of population in Tacoma.
- Retirees and working age adults without children are growing segments.
- Households with very low incomes and Black households have declining rates of homeownership.
- Adjusted for inflation, real median household income has increased by about 22% since 2011, but significant race-based disparities exist.

Highlighted Equity Takeaways

- Different geographies and population groups experience different strengths and gaps.
- A targeted universalism approach tailors policy strategies to these distinct needs.
- For example, the North East is most likely to lag in bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, walkability, and commercial amenity access.
- For example, South Tacoma is most negatively impacted by urban heat, slower police response times, and childhood poverty.

Engagement Strategy: An Integrated Approach

- The Tacoma community has been extensively engaged in recent years
- The community engagement strategy should leverage existing data and existing engagement efforts to minimize respondent burden and confusion
- Additional resources or "new engagement" should be focused on thematic gaps and/or gaps by community group.



Community Input

 Plan development will reflect both input from previous engagement efforts and input from recent engagement activities.

What we're building on from previous plans

Urban Form

Enable transportation choices such as walking, biking, and transit, in part through better pedestrian and bike connectivity

Make vehicular traffic safety improvements, including traffic calming on major corridors

Encourage income-diverse neighborhoods and more housing opportunities/options through promoting mixed housing types and modest residential density increases

Improve/repair infrastructure with a focus on equitable access for residents of diverse incomes, race, ethnicity, and abilities



Economic Development

Strengthen and diversify Tacoma's local economy

Create a trained, future ready workforce

Promote Downtown Tacoma as a regional center of commerce

Support employment-generating activities

Support small businesses and creative artistic enterprises through programs and resources

Expand green jobs, especially at the Port, through sectors such as green energy, maritime, and green building technologies

Produce and preserve affordable housing

Continue marketing efforts

Design + Development

Maintain distinct character of neighborhoods and support design and development that reflects local history, context, and cultures

Add urban design features that integrate environmental restoration such as green sidewalks, public spaces with street trees and plantings, natural habitat restoration, water stewardship, native plants, and community gardens

Support and encourage small businesses and arts and creative spaces

Bring more art, color, and creativity to streetscapes



Transportation

Eliminate traffic violence, in part through improved pedestrian and bike safety and speeding reduction measures

Establish more frequent and reliable transit services

Improve pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure to create walkable neighborhoods and, support climate goals, and reduce traffic violence

Make transportation investments, especially sidewalk infrastructure, equitably available and maintained across city neighborhoods

Address transportation equity issues for persons using wheelchairs or otherwise facing mobility challenges



Environment + Watershed Health

Restore and protect natural spaces and waterways

Integrate environmental and watershed health actions with other goals such as green jobs, climate action, equity, parks and green spaces, transportation, and housing

Create partnerships to support water and environmental restoration and stewardship, including with the Puyallup

Increase funding to protect groundwater and develop and maintain needed groundwater infrastructure

Address air and water pollution impacts on community health



Parks + Recreation

Maintain existing parks and facilities

Ensure natural areas are maintained for future generations

Renovate or upgrade aging parks and facilities

Purchase and preserve wildlife-rich

Develop new walking/biking trails



Climate

Transition away from fossil fuels, in part by improving transportation alternatives and bringing daily necessities within walking distance of residential areas

Ensure that sustainability policies are equitable and don't place burden on lower income or disadvantaged residents

Expand green economy and green jobs

Expand tree cover to reduce heat, clean



Public Facilities + Services

Properly resource and make improvements to libraries to ensure their role as safe third spaces for youth and families and community gathering spaces for social events and meetings

Expand resources and opportunities for those experiencing homelessness

Evaluate childcare needs and resources to support multigenerational living and kinship caregiving

Address community safety and policing issues, including traffic enforcement, crime prevention, gang activity, drugs, and gun control

Make all schools a priority for safe acces walkability, and bikeability

Consider partnerships for before and afterschool time, preschool development, enrichment, and workforce development



Housing

Make housing affordable to a range of income levels, and accessible to those who have historically been subject to housing inequality

Encourage balanced growth by preserving historic structures and maintaining neighborhood character, while allowing for modest increases in density to expand housing opportunity

Ensure that neighborhood infrastructure and services keep pace with growth

Expand resources and opportunities for those experiencing homelessness

Address common neighborhood concerns, including parking and traffic, preserving neighborhood character and views, quality and accessibility of open space, and associated infrastructure and services



Historic Preservation

There has not been broad citywide engagement on historic preservation, which is a reason why it's especially important for us to hear from you on this topic!




- Events in each neighborhood council district - 8 workshops in person and 1 virtual









Above: Future Land Use Map
