RESOLUTION NO. 41596

1 A RESOLUTION setting Tuesday, February 4, 2025, upon completion of Regular
2 Agenda Items, no earlier than 5:15 p.m., as the date for a public hearing
3 by the City Council on the consideration for extending an existing
4 moratorium on certain uses within the South Tacoma Groundwater
5 Protection District.

6 WHEREAS on June 28, 2022, the City Council adopted Amended
7 Substitute Resolution No. 40985, approving the work plan for the South Tacoma
8 Groundwater Protection District ("STGPD") Code Amendments ("work plan"), and
9 directing the Planning Commission ("Commission") to "... conduct a public
10 process to develop findings of fact and recommendations as to whether a
11 moratorium on heavy industrial uses and storage of hazardous materials within
12 the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District is warranted", and

13 WHEREAS the Commission completed its review and deliberations of the
14 matter through a public process, and forwarded its Findings of Fact and
15 Recommendations Report, along with a letter of recommendations to the City
16 Council for consideration on August 17, 2022, and

17 WHEREAS the Commission concluded that a broad moratorium could
18 result in detrimental, inequitable and/or disproportionate impacts to diverse
19 businesses and uses that are of various types, purposes, characteristics,
20 operations and maintenance needs, and risks to the environment, and instead
21 recommended that a targeted moratorium was warranted for the following uses
22 within the STGPD: (1) underground storage tanks; (2) metal recycling/auto
23 wrecking; (3) vehicle service and repair; and (4) vehicle service and repair-
24 industrial, and
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1 WHEREAS at the September 20, 2022, Study Session, staff presented the
2 Commission's recommendations to the City Council, and

3 WHEREAS the City Council referred the recommendations to the
4 Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability ("IPS") Committee for further
5 consideration, and

6 WHEREAS, on November 9, 2022, the IPS Committee conducted a
7 panelist discussion with representatives from the South Tacoma neighborhood,
8 as well as representatives from both local, potentially affected businesses, and
9 the Tacoma-Pierce County Chamber of Commerce, and
10

11 WHEREAS, on November 30, 2022, the IPS Committee approved
12 amendments to the Commission proposal and forwarded the recommendations
13 to the City Council to set a public hearing date to consider the proposed
14 moratorium, and

15 WHEREAS the amendments to the Commission proposal are as follows:

16
17 1. Use Categories: The IPS Committee did not find sufficient risk to
18 groundwater resources from the establishment or expansion of vehicle service
19 and repair, or industrial vehicle service and repair uses to warrant a moratorium.
20 Therefore, the moratorium should apply only to metal recycling/auto wrecking
21 and underground storage tanks;
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23 2. Expansion of Existing Uses: The IPS Committee found that a
24 moratorium that is too restrictive on the expansion of existing uses could have
25 the counter effect of prohibiting improvements that provide environmental benefit
26 or reduce the risks and impacts of existing uses. Therefore, the moratorium



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should allow for reasonable facility and site development that improves environmental outcomes while avoiding the introduction of new risks to the City's groundwater resources, and

WHEREAS on March 7, 2023, following a public hearing and substantial public input, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28872, enacting a moratorium within the STGPD as recommended by the IPS Committee, and

WHEREAS the moratorium in Ordinance No. 28872 became effective on March 20, 2023, and was enacted for an initial period of up to one year, to expire on March 20, 2024, and applied to the establishment of new, or the expansion of existing underground storage tanks and metal recycling/auto wrecking facilities, and

WHEREAS on December 20, 2023, the Commission recommended updating the STGPD work plan to adopt a more comprehensive approach, considering current and upcoming initiatives related to the STGPD code update, this recommendation came in response to significant changes and resource allocations since the original work plan adoption, and

WHEREAS on March 5, 2024, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28958, extending the existing moratorium for another six months, with the new expiration date set for September 20, 2024, and

WHEREAS the extension was due to updates to the STGPD work plan and the identification of ongoing research needs, and



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WHEREAS on August 27, 2024, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28977, extending the moratorium once again for another six months, to expire on March 20, 2025, and

WHEREAS staff is requesting an additional extension of the moratorium in order to continue prohibiting the establishment of new, or the expansion of existing underground storage tanks, and metal recycling/auto wrecking facilities within the STGPD to allow the current level of these uses and activities to be maintained for an additional six months, facilitating the completion of necessary research initiatives and ensuring comprehensive evaluation of the STGPD code, and other relevant policies and regulations; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That Tuesday, February 4, 2025, upon completion of Regular Agenda Items, no earlier than 5:15 p.m., is hereby fixed as the time, and the City Council Chambers on the First Floor of the Tacoma Municipal Building, 747 Market Street, Tacoma, Washington, and may be offered in a hybrid format that includes a remote option, as the place when and where a public hearing shall be held on the extension of the moratorium on certain uses within the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District as recommended by the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee.

place of said hearing.

1 A RESOLUTION relating to infrastructure projects; accepting grants from the
2 Puget Sound Regional Council, Transportation Improvement Board, and
3 the Washington State Department of Transportation, in the total amount
4 of \$10,627,945, and depositing said sum into the Capital Project funds,
5 together with \$3,741,880 in matching City funds, budgeted from various
6 funds, for a cumulative total of \$14,369,825, to fund various Public
7 Works projects, including pedestrian facilities, ADA accessibility,
8 bikeways, roadway improvements, traffic signals, transportation plans,
9 and other transportation infrastructure improvements.

10 WHEREAS the City's Six-Year Comprehensive Transportation
11 Improvement Program ("TIP") is updated annually to include planned
12 transportation projects for the remaining year and the ensuing six years, and
13 each update includes public outreach and engagement, community and
14 Transportation Commission outreach, and a public hearing, and

15 WHEREAS outreach for the Transportation Master Plan included
16 engagement in under-represented neighborhoods where improvements
17 historically have not met expectations, with a goal of identifying opportunities in
18 these neighborhoods to help assure that community spending is allocated
19 equitably city-wide, and Public Works ("PW") staff used data, building on the
20 City's Equity Index, to allocate infrastructure improvements and to prioritize
21 improvements in under-represented neighborhoods increasing community trust
22 with data driven decisions, and

23 WHEREAS PW applied for grants for numerous infrastructure projects in
24 2024, and six projects were selected to receive up to \$10,627,945 in grant
25 funding, and
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1 WHEREAS notification of grant awards or supplemental funding was
2 received for six projects, as follows: (1) Puyallup Avenue Corridor - \$5,465,000;
3 (2) 6th Avenue and Tacoma Avenue Pavement Preservation - \$792,406;
4 (3) Tacoma Mall Neighborhood Loop Road Active Transportation Plan -
5 \$284,000; South 11th Street and South Sprague Avenue Signalized Intersection
6 Improvements - \$1,200,000; (4) East Roosevelt Avenue Arterial
7 Improvements - \$2,213,118; and (5) South 56th Street Crossing
8 Improvements - \$673,421, and

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10 WHEREAS this resolution will support the City's goals for equity and
11 accessibility, and PW's goals for access, safety and traffic flow on City streets,
12 pedestrian facilities, and bicycle facilities and infrastructure improvements align
13 with Racial Equity Action Plan goals to enhance an organizational culture
14 supporting anti-racist actions and equitable infrastructure in a timely manner,
15 allowing all community members access to the City's transportation
16 infrastructure in a variety of different modes, and

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18 WHEREAS the grant awards require a City match of \$3,741,880, and

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20 WHEREAS, under the grant process guidelines, the City Council must
21 approve acceptance of grant funding; Now, Therefore,

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23 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

24 Section 1. That the proper officers of the City are hereby authorized to
25 accept grants from the Puget Sound Regional Council, Transportation
26 Improvement Board, and the Washington State Department of Transportation in
the amount of \$10,627,945, for deposit into the Capital Project funds, together



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with \$3,741,880 in matching City funds, budgeted from various funds, for a cumulative total of \$14,369,825, to fund various Public Works projects, including pedestrian facilities, ADA accessibility, bikeways, roadway improvements, traffic signals, transportation plans, and other transportation infrastructure improvements, as more fully set forth in the attached Exhibit "A."

These improvements will assist pedestrians and cyclists in crossing the busy South 56th Street, while cutting down on cut-through traffic on A Street and providing a more direct and safer walking route to the Fawcett Elementary School and Stewart Heights Park.
