RECYCLING PROGRAM CHECKLIST

Fill out this checklist to find out if you are prepared to set up a successful recycling program!



Avoid fees and missed collections from illegal dumping by reviewing your recycling program every year.

Is it easy to recycle in my building?
All recycle bins are clearly labeled with what can be recycled
There is information on how to Recycle Right near the recycle bin
All residents have received updated Recycle Right information in the past 12 months
There are reminders on how to Recycle Right in community newsletters and meetings
If you answered " NO " on any statement above, visit <i>tacomarecycles.org</i> to download recycling flyers or contact Solid Waste for new labels.
Am I doing everything I can to prevent illegal dumping? YES NO
There is a recycle bin next to every garbage bin
The waste area is clean and well-maintained, and the bins are not damaged or vandalized
Bulky items, garbage, or hazardous materials are not left on the ground or in the recycle bin
If you answered " NO " on any statement above, contact Solid Waste to learn how you can prevent illegal dumping or replace damaged bins.
Do I need to make any adjustments to my recycle/garbage service? YES NO
There are recyclables (ex: cardboard, water bottle) in the garbage bin
There is garbage (ex: food, clothing, non-recyclable items) in the recycle bin
The recycle bin is full before it is picked up
The recycle bin is less than 75% full before it is picked up
If you answered "YES" on any statement above, contact Solid Waste to change your level of service.



HOW TO SET OUT YOUR RECYCLE BINS

Avoid additional fees from illegal dumping and missed collections by following these steps:











- Set out the recycle bin by 6 a.m. on your pickup day.
- **Spacing is important.** Place the bins with wheels to the curb, and at least 4 feet apart and away from overhead structures (e.g. tree branches, telephone poles) and other objects.





Remove the recycle bin from the curb once it is emptied.





Call a Solid Waste representative at (253) 502-2100 if your recycle bin is not picked up, or if you have questions about set out guidelines.





HOW TO RECYCLE RIGHT



Plastic bags jam sorting equipment and can cause the entire recycling facility to shut down. Do NOT put recyclables in plastic bags! Use a reusable bag or bin to carry out and empty recyclables into the bin.

Why empty, clean, and dry? Recyclables should be empty, clean and dry to prevent contamination of other recyclables. Contaminated recyclables have to all be sent to the landfill!





8 ITEMS THAT DO NOT BELONG IN THE RECYCLE BIN



Entire loads of recyclables have to be thrown out if they contain just a fraction of garbage or dirty items. Look it up or leave it out of the recycle bin!

These items are often mistakenly put in the recycle bin. Learn how to properly dispose of them!

GARBAGE

Throw away in the garbage bin.

CARTONS & FROZEN FOOD CONTAINERS



Cartons have layers of paper, metal, and plastic to hold in liquid. Frozen food boxes contain plastic to protect food from freezer burn. Our facilities cannot separate these layers.

COFFEE CUPS



Disposable coffee cups are lined with plastic. Our facilities do not have the technology to separate these layers.

PIZZA BOXES



Pizza boxes are dirty from cheese, sauce, and oil. Only clean cardboard can be recycled.

DROP-OFF

at Household Hazardous Waste at 3510 S. Mullen St.

X Batteries can NOT be thrown in the garbage.



BATTERIES

Batteries are hazardous waste and contain toxins that can contaminate soil and water if disposed of incorrectly.

DROP-OFF at the Recycle Center at 3510 S. Mullen St.

These items can be thrown away OR recycled at the Recycle Center.

PLASTIC BAGS & WRAP



Plastic bags get caught in and jam recycling sorting machines, halting the entire recycling process.

CLAMSHELL PLASTIC



Clamshell plastic flattens easily, making it difficult for machines to correctly sort them.

STYROFOAM



Styrofoam packaging blocks and peanuts break apart easily, creating litter and making it difficult for machines to correctly sort.

ELECTRICAL CORDS



Power cords, string lights, and charging cables tangle and jam sorting machines.





RECYCLE RIGHT MOVING GUIDE

Moving can create a lot of waste. Dispose of unwanted items the right way by following these steps.



Sell or donate items that are in good condition.

Visit cityoftacoma.org/wastefree253 for a list of places to sell or donate your items.





Visit the Tacoma Recovery & Transfer Center at 3510 S. Mullen St.

Drop off items that can't be sold or donated, including clothes, small appliances, boxes and packing material, large bulky items, and household hazardous waste. Visit cityoftacoma.org/solidwaste or call 253-502-2100 for more information.

Drop off Electronic Waste at an E-cycle location.

Visit RecycleWashington.org or call 1-800-RECYCLE for a list of eligible items and to find a E-cycle location near you. Do NOT dispose of e-waste in the trash or recycle bin.







Schedule a pick-up with Call-2-Haul.

Up to 3 large items and 15 boxes or bags of small items of garbage can be collected per pickup. Visit cityoftacoma.org/call2haul for a list of accepted items and fees or call (253) 573-2468.

8 ITEMS THAT CAN BE DROPPED OFF AT THE TACOMA RECOVERY & TRANSFER CENTER

Moving or getting rid of stuff? The Tacoma Recovery & Transfer Center at 3510 S. Mullen St. is a one stop drop-off for a variety of household items. Find hours at cityoftacoma.org/solidwaste.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Drop off items for free. View a full list of accepted items and guidelines at cityoftacoma.org/hazwaste.

OIL-BASED PAINT



Oil-based paints are flammable and cannot be recycled or thrown in the trash. Latex or water-based paints can be donated or dried and thrown away.

HOUSEHOLD CLEANERS



Some household cleaners can release toxic gases in certain circumstances, and require professional disposal. Call (253) 591-5418 if you have unknown cleaners in your possession. Find alternative green cleaner recipes at cityoftacoma.org/envirohouse.

FLUORESCENT BULBS & TUBES



Fluorescent bulbs and tubes contain mercury vapors, and should not be broken or thrown in the trash.

TACOMA RECYCLE CENTER

Drop off recyclables for free. View a full list of accepted items at tacomarecycles.org.

CLOTHING



Clothing can be dropped off in the Northwest Center clothing bin. Clothing in great condition will be donated, while ripped and stained clothing will be recycled.

MICROWAVE



Metal household appliances that do not contain chemicals or Freon, like microwaves and ovens, can be recycled in the scrap metal bin.

MOVING BOXES & PACKAGING MATERIAL



Large moving boxes can be recycled in the cardboard bin. Packing materials, like plastic film, Styrofoam and bubble wrap, can be recycled in the Styrofoam and plastic film bins.

SELF-HAUL GARBAGE

MATTRESSES



Drop off your mattress for a fee at the Tacoma Recovery & Transfer Center, or you can recycle your mattress with NW Furniture Bank for a fee. Learn more at nwfurniturebank.org/ mattress-recycling.

AC UNIT



Household appliances, like air conditioning units and refrigerators, contain Freon that can leak and pose health and environmental hazards. These must be dropped off at the Tacoma Recovery & Transfer Center to be professionally disposed of.



Recycle bins full? Drop off bulky recyclables such as shipping boxes at the Tacoma Recycle Center year round.
